Discussion Points

- 1. Childhood and old age, similarities and differences.
- 2. The child's awareness of the frailties of her grandma.
- 3. Her grandma's understanding of the child's fears.
- 4. The old and the young both rebel against the rules of the man (unseen) in the middle.
- 5. The child's easy acceptance of old age and death.
- 6. How does Jansson use visual perspectives in conveying the acute observational skills of the grandmother? For example, sometimes we see the island very close up and sometimes as very remote.
- 7. Does their love of nature help them to create a sense of joy as well as to understand the precarity of nature and of old age?
- 8. How does Jansson disrupt and challenge stereotypes of age and youth?
- 9. How important is intergenerational solidarity in the book?
- 10. How important is imagination and play in the book for countering the sorrows of youth and age?
